



REASONS TO THINK ORANGE REGION

THINK.ONE

Pure Water, Climate,

The region experiences mild summers and cold winters with an average annual rainfall of approximately 900mm. The fertile volcanic soils are suitable for a range of agricultural enterprises focused around livestock, in particular sheep farming and cattle farming, as well as grain production, dairy farming and fruit production. Viticulture for cool climate wine is continuing to develop in the region.

THINK.TWO

Unique Mineral Resources

The region has unique geology containing metalliferous minerals such as gold. This has enabled the development of one of the largest gold mines in Australia. Other exploration has been occurring in the region, with potential for further gold and copper mining projects.

THINK.THREE

Established Agriculture Infrastructure & Services The region contains significant agriculture infrastructure and services, including the Central Tablelands Livestock Exchange, Barnaby Bank in Orange/financing, the DPI head office and the Global AgTech Ecosystem (GATE).

THINK.FOUR

Reliable Orange Regional Airport Orange Regional Airport is a key transport hub for the Central West, providing daily passenger connections with Sydney and weekday passenger flights to Brisbane and Melbourne. It also provides a base for a growing number of aero-industry businesses. This direct access to major capital cities enhances the desirability of the region for businesses, residents and tourists.

THINK.FIVE

Reputable Education Infrastructure The region is home to a range of education facilities for all ages, from primary schools and high schools offering unique education for a range of needs including disability education services such as Anson Street School, through to Charles Sturt University, Orange College (TAFE) and the School of Rural Health which offer courses related to job opportunities in the region.

THINK.SIX

Ideal Location, Accessibility & Lifestyle

The region is centrally located in the heart of NSW, close to Bathurst as well as Parkes and its proposed national transport node. It is connected to Sydney, Brisbane and Melbourne via flights from Orange Regional Airport. It also has rail access to Sydney. The region's affordable house prices, rural lifestyle choices, small community feel, natural beauty, and diverse economy also make the region liveable and an attractive place to raise a family, retire, semi-retire, study or work.

Abundant Natural Resources The region is also endowed with a range of natural resources and features including lakes, waterholes and dams such as Suma Park Dam, National Parks, State Conservation Areas, nature reserves and caves, contrasted by the pinnacle that is Mount Canobolas.

Rich Heritage & History

The region has a rich Aboriginal and European heritage. There are many significant Aboriginal sites within the region, and the Wiradjuri people have an interest in significant development projects. The region also contains numerous towns and villages with extensive built heritage. These offer new residents and businesses a diverse range of locational choices and are important resources for regional tourism.


Dependable Healthcare Infrastructure

The region contains diversified health services provision and one of the largest regional hospitals in NSW, which is a teaching hospital affiliated with the University of Sydney. The hospital is also used for teaching students from other universities including the Charles Sturt University, University of Newcastle and University of Wollongong. It is co-located with the redeveloped Bloomfield mental health services. These services will be further reinforced by the immerging Life Science Precinct Project.

Vibrant Local Institutions. Strong Leadership and a Ready Workforce The region is well supported by an array of education, health, tourism, professional services and business institutions. In addition, the three Councils in the region have strong relationships between them and with businesses and economic development institutions resulting in a vibrant business community and a ready

HEALTH CARE AND SOCIAL ASSISTANCE

Health Care and Social Assistance is the largest sector in the region, employing 17.5% of the workforce. It is also an industry in which the region specialises when compared to the rest of NSW. Between 2011 and 2016, employment in this sector grew at a much faster rate in the region than it did across NSW (exceeding the industry employment growth rate across NSW by 12%).


NSW 2011-2016






FOOD & BEVERAGE / TOURISM

ECONOMIC PROFILE

Orange is a thriving regional city located on the Mitchell Highway, just 3 1/2 hours' drive west of Sydney and Canberra. Its economy is diverse and growing, benefiting from recent mining and health service activities. Orange regio is well-served by educational facilities and community infrastructure, making Orange the ideal place to call home.

KEY SECTORS

The mining sector plays a key role in the growth of Orange, representing nearly a quarter of the entire economy. However, Orange's economy is diversified across a number of sectors, including healthcare, public administration, manufacturing, education and training.

MAJOR EMPLOYERS

Major employers in the area include Newcrest Mining, Orange Local Health Service, NSW Department of Education and Training, Charles Sturt University and the NSW Department of Primary Industries, as well as key businesses servicing these large employers including mining and manufacturing businesses such as Pybar and Jeff Hort Engineering.

IDENTIFIED OPPORTUNITIES

Opportunities for future economic development include:

MINING — building on the strengths of the Cadia Valley Operations mining projects, opportunities exist to widen the mining supply chain locally.

HEALTH CARE — with a growing and ageing population, opportunities across all health care sectors inclusive of mental health services will continue to provide growth opportunities, in addition to the Life Science Precinct Project.

ADVANCED MANUFACTURING — leveraging a strong advanced manufacturing base, opportunities exist to grow the advanced manufacturing sector (potentially as part of the mining supply chain). Large land sites are available to setup businesses, including the old Electrolux site.

EDUCATION — with a strong education base including Charles Sturt University, TAFE and other educational providers, opportunities existing to grow the education sector.

ECONOMIC PROFILE

THINK Cabonne... think Food & Wine, Historic Towns & Villages, Agriculture, Mining, Manufacturing, Tourism, Milling, Gold Rush, Ballooning, Picturesque Landscape

Pristine Cabonne Shire, 'Australia's Food Basket', is situated in Central NSW 3 ½ hours drive from both Sydney and Canberra. The area is home to Australia's first gold rush and is well known for ballooning, food and wine, agriculture and mining.

Cabonne Shire includes the quaint historical towns of Borenore, Canowindra (pronounced Ca-noun-dra), Cargo, Cudal (pronounced Cue-Dal), Cumnock, Eugowra, Manildra, Molong, Mullion Creek, Nashdale, Ophir and Yeoval.

KEY SECTORS

Cabonne's economy was founded on agriculture (mostly grains), which still accounts for a large proportion of economic activity. Recently, agricultural activities have become more diverse and mining has played an increasing role, helping to drive economic growth.

Manufacturing has also become another important economic sector specifically for food and wine products.

MAJOR EMPLOYERS

Cabonne Shire is home to a number of large manufacturers, including businesses that leverage local agricultural production, such as the Manildra Flour Milling, MSM Milling Manildra, Canobolas Eggs and Bryton Wool.

IDENTIFIED OPPORTUNITIES

Opportunities for future economic development include:

FOOD MANUFACTURING — the combination of inexpensive input costs and a progressive Council provide competitive conditions for increased manufacturing activity and have resulted in a growth in the "value adding" sector.

MINING — growth in regional mines will support further opportunities to grow the mining sector including Copper Hill in

MANUFACTURING — with a strong focus on mining, farming and food, Cabonne Shire is a favourable location for manufacturing, particularly with regard to business land development in Molong and Canowindra.

TOURISM — the region's attractive rural landscape, quaint towns and existing food, wine and arts sectors all support future growth in tourism, featuring an annual ballooning event, Australian National Field Days and the world's oldest fish fossils at the Age of

The scenic region of the Blayney Shire is located 3 ½ hours from Sydney and Canberra. Blayney is a unique regional business community featuring many commercial and industrial opportunities throughout the main town of Blayney and the historical villages of Barry, Carcoar, Lyndhurst, Mandurama, Millthorpe, Neville and Newbridge.

KEY SECTORS

Blayney's economy is considered diverse for a rural area. Key sectors include mining, manufacturing, agriculture, construction, education and training.

The Blayney Shire offers many services and is in close proximity to the two major town centres of Bathurst and Orange.

Blayney has a rail terminal and direct road access to Sydney, Melbourne and Adelaide. The region supplies fully serviced facilities and strategically located industrial land that is accessible to the Mid-Western Highway and the Great Western Highway.

MAJOR EMPLOYERS

The industrial and business sector in the Blayney Shire is well established and hosts a number of large companies including Blayney SeaLink (a major cold storage operation), Linfox, Nestlè, Newcrest Mining and Australian Native Landscapes.

There are a number of niche industry sectors in Blayney, including larger consumer goods and rural retailers, construction and building, metal fabrication, car mechanics and refrigerated warehousing.

Blayney Shire also has one of the most advanced livestock facilities in Australia. The Central Tablelands Livestock Exchange (CTLX) at Carcoar is one of the largest in NSW catering for all stock exchanges across this region of NSW. CTLX provides the Central Tablelands Region with a state-of-the-art livestock auction facility.

IDENTIFIED OPPORTUNITIES

Opportunities for future economic development include:

MINING — Blayney is attractive to companies in the mining sector anchored by the Newcrest mining development and new prospects in Kings Plains.

TRANSPORT AND WAREHOUSING — an existing intermodal terminal with direct import/export rail link to Sydney Ports, serviced industrial land, existing cold storage export facilities and its strategic location make Blayney Shire a great place for transport logistics and warehousing operations.

FOOD MANUFACTURING — Blayney Shire is the ideal location to develop the latest in food processing facilities directly aimed at exporting food to international markets. Nestlè is expanding its Purina factory to incorporate a greater demand in dog food

TRANSPORT — Blayney is the ideal location for transport companies relocating to cover access to other States and be accessible to Sydney and Parkes inland rail.

KEY GROWTH SECTORS



MINING

The region has a long history of mining that goes back to the 1850s Gold Rush. With modern technology, gold and copper deposits previously beyond the reach of miners are now an economic proposition.

Councils within the Orange Region support growth in mining and mining services recognising the large-scale positive economic impacts of mining and the prospect of future growth.

The Orange Region is dedicated to ensuring efficient mining related infrastructure is in place (land and water) to support a sustainable mining sector that is environmentally friendly.

New areas are regularly identified for exploration throughout the region with several promising sites on the horizon. Companies currently operating include Newcrest's Cadia Valley Operations (with approval for mining until 2030 with at least 30-years of resource) and Regis Resources (developing a large-scale gold mine near Blayney).



HEALTH

The region's strong healthcare sector is recognised as a core specialisation to be further developed and is well equipped with the Orange Health Service, a large private hospital, construction of a medi-precinct, linked services include medical imaging, radiography, neurology and the Orange regional nursing service.

Multi-purpose hospitals Blayney, Canowindra and Molong all operate emergency services. There is also a large aged-care sector in Orange and aged-care facilities in Blayney, Canowindra and Molong, as well as GP's servicing all towns and regional villages.

Growth in this sector will increase demand for specialised aged care health services. The health and social assistance sectors share linkages with both TAFE and the university sector.

EDUCATION & PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION

The region is a centre for education and public administration in NSW. The region hosts a thriving independent school sector as people from further west place their children in schools within the Orange Region.

It also boasts a strong tertiary sector, with three TAFE Western campuses in Orange and a Charles Sturt University campus. These institutions provide education and training in agriculture, business, trades, health, dental and social assistance training.

The NSW Government is well represented in the region through offices for the Department of Industry, the Rural Assistance Authority, Local Land Services and the Department of Premier and Cabinet. The DPI's Head Office is also based in Orange and provides a large employment base, as does Service NSW and Barnabys Bank.



ADVANCED MANUFACTURING

The Orange Region leverages a strong advanced manufacturing base. Opportunities continue to exist to grow the advanced manufacturing sector, potentially as part of the mining supply chain, as well as the West Connex project in Sydney.





AGRICULTURE / PROCESSING / AGRI-TECHNOLOGY & MANUFACTURING

Primary production is a feature of the region's economic activity over three sectors. Currently the strategy of the combined Councils is to develop existing strengths in agriculture, agricultural processing, agri-technology and manufacturing.

A key focus is to build on the region's specialisations in broadacre grazing and cropping to grow and add value to local agricultural production.

Agricultural processing such as food processing and wine production is also a focus in order to encourage and further develop 'in region' agricultural manufacturing, and to contribute to the growth of tourism through leveraging the region's emerging wine industry.

An excellent example of thriving, long-standing businesses in this sector include Manildra Flour Mill. MSM Milling and Bite Riot.

Support services (including agricultural and mining equipment) also form an integral part of the focus in order to engage in manufacturing where the region has a competitive advantage.



TRANSPORT & WAREHOUSING

The central location and strategic commitment to developing opportunities in the transport and warehousing sectors by Councils in the Orange Region provide an ideal opportunity for investment.

The Blayney Shire's existing intermodal terminal is an example of the commitment to this sector in the region. The terminal provides direct import and export rail links to Sydney Ports, serviced industrial land and existing cold storage export facilities.

Further priorities in this sector include the development of a strategy to integrate the region into the Parkes Intermodal Freight Terminal and maximising opportunities created by direct international flights from Canberra Airport to the rest of the world.



FOOD MANUFACTURING

Relatively inexpensive input costs and strong support from all councils in the Orange Region provide the ideal combination for increased food manufacturing activity in the region. Opportunity exists across a range of sectors including the standout food and wine manufacturing industry.

An excellent example of thriving food manufacturing in the area includes the expanding Purina factory in the Blayney Shire which is meeting the growing demand for dog food supplies nationwide.

TOURISM

The Orange Region is becoming increasingly well known for its natural assets, wine industry and the liveability of its city, towns and villages. Local Councils are committed to driving tourism growth and enhancing the liveability of the region.

A key joint commitment has been the development of Orange360. Orange City Council, Blayney Shire Council and Cabonne Council initiative is the first of its kind of tourism 'products' and accommodation and is essentially a cooperative approach to marketing the region.

With more than a million visitors already exploring the region per year, Orange360

is focused on working with local groups, events industry and providers to drive increased visitor numbers and economic benefits across the entire region.

Opportunities exist to build on the region's strengths in food and wine, historic villages, events, weddings, agri-tourism, road trips, rail links to Sydney and airport links to Sydney, Brisbane and Melbourne. A range have been identified as key opportunities in this sector.

OPPORTUNITY BECKONED FOR SYDNEY TO ORANGE TREE CHANGERS

When Sydney couple Rachel and Ben Quirk stopped off in Orange to feed a hungry baby on a road trip west, never did they think they would be leading three generations of their tribe to the region in an epic tree change.

Rachel confesses she was a Sydney girl through and through, but the chance stopover in Orange got the couple thinking about the opportunity of providing a better lifestyle for their young family.

"We were passing though Orange, and both thought - we love this place - it's gorgeous," Rachel explained. "We are procrastinators at heart, but the more we researched the area - the more we were convinced.

"We looked ahead at the education and universities available for our two son's William and Vincent. We considered the infrastructure and socially what was available to us as a family.

"I was in a pretty niche industry, so we also had to consider what employment opportunities were available to us both. Once we made the decision, everything just fell into place. We bought an investment property first and then within two weeks we both landed great jobs."



Ben took on a newly created position as the Central West Territory Sales Manager for Position Partners a provider of positioning and machine control solutions for surveying, civil contracting, earthmoving, mining and building activities.

Rachel landed a position as the Work Health Safety Risk and Compliance Manager with Paraway Pastoral Company Ltd, one of the largest agriculture property owners in Australia.

The Company holds more than 4.4 million hectares which is aggregated into 23 pastoral businesses with the capacity to run more than 200,000 cattle and 240,000 sheep along with a mixture of dryland and irrigated cropping.

Paraway relocated its head office from Sydney to Orange in 2015 in a move expanding Orange's reputation as an ideal agribusiness centre. Paraway has now incorporated all corporate services, payroll, finance, risk, human resources, and environment positions along with dedicated analytical, technical and operations teams and associated administration support in the Orange head office.

Rachel explained the business tree change for Paraway has seemingly been as successful as it has been for the Quirk family. In just four years, the Orange office has grown from 5 to 32 staff.

"Initially Paraway was part of Macquarie bank and based in the Macquarie building in Sydney," Rachel outlined. "Being located in Sydney created some challenges for our business given all of our assets were regionally based and the high costs associated with operating an office in Sydney.

"When searching for the appropriate regional location, Orange was chosen as we thought it provided the right balance between being central to our assets, proximity to Sydney, outstanding infrastructure, a high performing workforce and cost effectiveness.

"We were really pleased that Orange already had some high performing professionals that were able to come into our business, but also found Orange to be an easy place to attract top talent from Sydney.

"We are career driven, but we wanted to spend more time with our kids. We did want it all, but we knew that Sydney was not the life we wanted to live."

"From a business perspective, Orange offers the best of all worlds - a professional and vibrant business environment with growing infrastructure and services along with the family and lifestyle benefits of living in the country."

On the back of such a thriving move, it seems there will be no change of heart for either Paraway or the Quirk family with their regional transition.

"We gave ourselves a buffer and genuinely thought if this doesn't work - we will go back," Rachel spoke frankly.

"We landed in Orange on Australia Day 2018, and now there is no way we would leave. We are actively recruiting our friends and family to move out here now.

"My parents were coming out every second weekend to help and spend time with us. They fell in-love with the area and began staying a few extra days to explore and visit the wineries. Now they are moving out permanently to Orange.

"We've got involved with the community through school and work. There are a lot of people working at Paraway due to the expansion and they are a social bunch. We found we become very ingrained very quickly in Orange.

"I'm risk adverse so we took our time with two years in consultation working out if this would be a good move for us as a family. It took less than a year for us to start to see the absolute rewards of our tree change.

"In Sydney, we would drop our kids at care at 6:30am and not pick them up until 6:30pm. We are career driven, but we wanted to spend more time with our kids. We did want it all, but we knew that Sydney was not the life we wanted to live.

"We couldn't be happier with school, care, work and life in general in Orange. Both boys are doing really well, and we get to spend so much more time with them. That has got to be better for us all."

They say the best ideas come from innovation at the coalface. Solving problems on the ground with the ability to upscale and reapply the technology the world over is a skill Orange based product developer, Simon Provost, has attained.

In a bid to solve a global safety problem with practical local application, S&P Industrial was founded in 2014 in response to a grassroots need for a flexible front-line defence for pumps.

From humble beginnings in a shed south of Orange where polymers were hand-poured into rudimental moulds, S&P Industrial now manufactures the patented Reflex Suction Strainers utilising the latest injection moulding techniques combined with cutting edge polymers marketed throughout the world.

An Orange local, Simon studied in Lismore and the United Kingdom before spending many years in Sydney and Brisbane working in corporate business product development and

The move back to the region was motivated by a desire to give his family the lifestyle opportunities that he had enjoyed growing up. While growing his young family in the region, Simon also began incubating a long-held goal of starting his own business.



"I had been working in corporate business for many years," Simon outlined. "I spent a lot of time coming up with ideas and making other people's businesses wealthy.

"I had always felt that I wanted to eventually do it for myself - to have a crack and take the risk because the end goal was for my family to be able to live somewhere great, have a good job, and the benefits of the country lifestyle that I had when I grew up.

"It's one of those dreams - to work for yourself. Working in a startup or your own business can be all-consuming, but ultimately the goal is to make the flexibility work for your family.

"It's definitely been a steep learning curve and a big investment. Four years out and I can say it has honestly all been worth it.

"We launched at the World Mining Expo in Vegas at the end of 2016. We now have product design registrations in Australia and the US along with patents pending in 80 countries across the

"We supply products into North America and Canada. We are working with huge mining companies like BHP. Glencore and Peabody along with big construction organisations such as those working in the tunnels in Sydney.

"Blackwoods now stock our product which has been huge for the business. They approached us which is happening a lot with overseas companies reaching out to us now. We are also trying to get a foothold into Europe now.

"It hasn't always been smooth sailing for sure, but we are now getting pretty close to making it to where we wanted to be. The speed of growth has been unbelievable."

Simon explained while head office has always been based in Orange, products are manufactured in an Australian family owned business in Western Sydney. He has travel time between the two now down to a fine art.

"Carefully avoiding peak-hour, I can be at our Sydney manufacturers in two and a half hours - so the benefits of quality of life to our family far outweighs any travel needed for the business," Simon outlined.

"The Orange Region is a unique place to live. The community, the climate, the schools and all the other facilities available - there are not many towns like this that exist in Australia.

"The region is a lot more diverse than when I was growing up. Since moving back, we have met a lot of people who have done the same thing. It's surprising how many people return to the region, or move out here from the city, to raise their family."

Simon's advice to others looking to start a business in the Orange region is to look for support from local organisations within the industry and think outside the box in relation to funding.

"The Australian Government gave us the most support with export development and research grants," Simon explained. "Orange expats were a huge support when it came to accessing grants creating a network out of Sydney to help us get started.

"I'm also on the board of a Central West regional engineering network in Orange known as RENWELD who provided valuable assistance. There are a lot of committed people in that network who have provided local support for many businesses."

MAJOR PROJECTS

ORANGE MAIN STREET PROJECT

Orange's main street is receiving a major facelift as part of the OC FutureCity Project which embraces a fundamental change in how the CBD is organised through the development of integrated economic activation precincts.

The project identifies the requirement to redesign traffic and people movements (freight, passenger, cyclist and pedestrian) and the associated enabling infrastructure, and improved connection of public spaces across the wider Orange City. OC FutureCity CBD incorporates a Business and Professional Services Precinct, a Retail and Hospitality Precinct Integration, and a Culture and Creativity Corridor.

The vision for Orange's CBD transformation is to create a place in the region for the next generation where the community and businesses will thrive. The CBD will be full of services, shops, open space, innovative businesses and cultural/recreation spaces for a contemporary, intelligently enabled, growing city that respects its history, heritage, environment and visual identity.

2020 DPI HEAD OFFICE MOVE TO ORANGE

The Department of Primary Industries (DPI) is set to have a new head office in Orange's CBD, housing up to 700 staff by 2020, providing a long-term boost for the economy.

The modern, three-storey, energy-efficient facility will be built on the old Orange Base Hospital site, helping to revitalise a key part of the city.

The move is thought to be one of the most significant projects to-date to decentralise government services and should create around 220 full-time jobs during construction alone. It has been estimated the project will provide in excess of a \$30 million boost to the local economy.

The new building will also house staff from Local Land Services along with the Departments of Industry, Premier & Cabinet, and Planning & Environment, pumping tens of millions of dollars directly into regional economies.

Construction commenced in early 2019 and the site is expected to be completed by mid-2020.

OPHIR CARPARK

Orange CBD's Ophir Carpark is set for an upgrade under the OC FutureCity Project with the construction of a multi-story carpark. The upgrade will support increased traffic to the nearby retail and business precinct.

Orange City Council is inviting Expressions of Interest from interested parties for the purchase and

redevelopment of the property known as Ophir Car Park located in Orange, in Central West NSW.

The property is situated in a prime CBD location, within one block from Orange's main street, on the corner of Lords Place and Kite Streets. These streets have significant traffic flow and serve as feeders for Orange's main shopping precinct as well as being used as a "main street bypass" for local traffic.

This ~11,000m², flat land parcel is ideally situated with multiple development options. There is the potential for it to be developed as a thriving new retail and office complex, mixed use centre with entertainment facility, or motel or serviced apartment accommodation in the heart of the city.

The proposed development opportunity is surrounded by a range of services for Orange locals and tourists alike with cafes and restaurants, national brand retail, franchises and boutiques and bulky goods retail shopping, government and community services, business services, banking and financial services, parks, schools, gardens and recreation all within walking distance. Current uses adjacent to the site on the surrounding corners are a 24-hour gym, a pharmacy supermarket, a licensed hotel and state government agencies. To the north and opposite on Kite Street is the main entrance and exit to main shopping centre and car park and adjoin to the south of the property a motorcycle dealership and a telecommunications infrastructure facility.

WOOLWORTHS CARPARK

Preliminary planning work has begun for Orange City Council's OC Future City initiative to transform Orange's CBD. A part of this is redeveloping the Woolworths carpark that borders Anson Street.

Orange City Council is currently seeking expressions of interest from developers to proceed to site development which could incorporate an eight-storey shopping centre, office and apartment complex and additional parking spaces

NEW BLOOMFIELD PRIVATE HOSPITAL

Construction has commenced for the new Bloomfield Private Hospital as part of a development approval for the \$54 million hospital health and retail precinct. The 82 room motel will feature 12 medical suites, short and medium term accommodation for hospital staff and students, and a lodge / hostel for patients and their families.

Other features flagged include childcare facilities, gymnasium, retail, cancer care facilities, allied health facilities (such as pathology, radiology and pharmacy) along with a GP clinic and specialist's rooms. An allocation of 803 car parking spaces has also been provided.

The new hospital will significantly increase the capacity of the health sector in Orange and ensure that medical professionals are attracted to the region with an expected growth of 500 full-time equivalent staff when fully operational once the flow-on impacts are taken into account. It will also expand the potential patient cohort for research, clinical training and clinical trials.







Orange is the new black according to one of the Region's leading fashion and homewares retailers, Pip Brett, owner of Jumbled and Iglou.

While the big retail chains are increasingly feeling the pinch of online shopping and a changing consumer landscape, Pip believes regionally based retail offering a holistic or niche experience will be the new growth realm.

The international award-winning business owner is a secondgeneration retailer in the area. Pip went to secondary school and then completed a Bachelor of Design in Sydney before returning to the Orange Region to settle, where her mum, Kezz, ran a women's boutique.

"We started with the clothing store 'Iglou' in 2006 and then opened our homewares store 'Jumbled' in 2012 before consolidating the two into one space at 'The Sonic' in 2016 - a concept store including a cafe," Pip outlined.

"Thirteen years ago, I felt there was an opening for fashion retail in regional areas. Online wasn't a big thing then and people were travelling four hours to Sydney to get what they wanted.



"Initially there was a reluctance from the city brands to be stocked in a rural store, but the success of the stores, and others like it in regional areas, has proven that you don't need to be in a metropolitan area to do well.

"We've definitely carved out our own retail niche. There are a lot of advantages to being regionally based. We were able to have much more control and a considerably bigger space to work with for a lot less money.

"What we have saved has allowed us to invest more into our online stores and quality staff. There are some great opportunities to employ some amazing people in regional areas.

"There is a huge talent pool to draw on from the highly skilled people who want to get out of the city to the local people who are also intrinsically personally invested and knowledgeable.

"I've had some staff for more than nine years and we really are a tight little family. That brings amazing advantages to the business.

The wind power station located above Carcoar Dam has 15 x 660Kw wind turbines producing clean energy. Eraring Energy feeds all electricity output into the transmission grid for distribution to their Green Power customers. A new 100 megawatt development of 40 turbines is also planned at Flyers Creek.


